



Background, Mission, Vision and Goal

1. Background

Gono Unnayan Prochesta, meaning Peoples' Development Efforts (in English), has been working since April 22, 1973. Gono Unnayan Prochesta arose from the Quakers' experience working with the impacted people in Bangladesh's rural areas shortly after the country's great Liberation War in 1971. Gono Unnayan Prochesta's earlier initiatives under the Food for Work Programme were limited to road construction, raising community flood centres, and excavating ponds, indicating a more relief/rehabilitation strategy. Gono Unnayan Prochesta was founded with the intention of providing development orientation to relief and rehabilitation initiatives carried out soon after the war, as well as lessening the community's reliance on aid.

Other services, such as agriculture with the introduction of new crops such as soybean, sugarcane and banana, Children's Health Care (CHC), Adult Functional Education (AFE), training programmes, school education, women and children's development, youth participation, and cooperative programmes have all been initiated over the years.

Gono Unnayan Prochesta established the Peace Centre in 1982 as part of its development thrust, intending to promote peace, harmony, and human rights in society. Gradually, Gono Unnayan Prochesta's programmes grew manifolds, including Water and Sanitation (WASH), Arsenic Mitigation, Disaster Management and Sustainable Livelihood Programmes for community members, particularly those from underprivileged and vulnerable backgrounds.

Mission Statement

Gono Unnayan Prochesta aims for sustainable development by ensuring food security, social justice, good governance, and the rights of disadvantaged, deprived, and disaster-affected communities, particularly for ultra-poor and destitute females and males, mothers and children, the elderly, physically challenged, beggars, sex workers, transport workers, marginal farmers, landless people, fishermen, handicraft artisans, and ethnic minorities. Gono Unnayan Prochesta is committed to forming samities, raising awareness, developing skills, promoting Income Generating Activities (IGA) through credit programmes and appropriate technologies, providing safe water, environmental sanitation, ecological farming, mother and child health development, and reproductive health.

Social Vision

Establishment of an environment friendly and exploitation free society where peace and social justice prevail.

Organisational Vision

Gono Unnayan Prochesta, which aspires to become an independent organization, is dedicated to achieving fairness, justice, peace and prosperity by implementing sustainable and environment friendly programmes that blend indigenous culture and traditions with modern technology.

Goal

To improve socio-cultural, economic and environmental security through empowering marginalized groups in the direction of social justice and peaceful coexistence.

3. Economic Programme

3.1 Microfinance Programme

Microfinance sector was first established in 1970s in Bangladesh and its main goal was to reduce rural poverty by providing microcredit loans for non-crop activities such as trading, raising livestock, poultry etc.

Gono Unnayan Prochesta started Income Generating Activities under the Cooperative and Credit Programme. At the beginning, the loan Programme of Gono Unnayan Prochesta was termed as Cooperative and Credit Programme, but now the programme is renamed as Microfinance Programme.

Microfinance Programme has aimed to provide livelihood options for the resource-poor individuals in the community, to improve their socio-economic conditions and reduce poverty by mobilizing their resources. Initially, Gono Unnayan Prochesta's own fund was invested to subsidize the establishment of a Credit Support Programme to a limited extent. Now, the Microfinance Programme is a key component that Gono Unnayan Prochesta operates for poverty alleviation and empowering poor women in its working area on a larger scale. It mobilizes the available resources for those who do not have access to resources from commercial banks. Presently Gono Unnayan Prochesta is operating its Microfinance Programme through 48 branchers in 8 Districts namely Madaripur, Shariatpur, Gopalganj, Faridpur, Chattogram, Cox'sBazar, Barisal and Bandorban.

The strategic objectives of Gono Unnayan Prochesta's Microfinance Programme are: Financial Inclusion and Capacity Development.

Financial Inclusion

Gono Unnayan Prochesta makes resources available to the unserved people excluded from the traditional banking system to start or run small businesses for their economic development and improved livelihood. Gono Unnayan Prochesta promotes financial inclusion, so that underserved individuals and small businesmen can have access to valuable and affordable financial products and services that meet their needs and are delivered responsibly and sustainably.

Capacity Development

Gono Unnayan Prochesta's capacity building activities focus on shoring up sustainability, improving governance, supporting collaboration and/or strengthening infrastructure. All have a common goal: augmenting the skills, resources and abilities that allow Gono Unnayan Prochesta's members to grow and blossom.

From 1996, Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) has been operating its Rural Micro Credit Programme (Jagoron, Agrosor and Buniad) in the names of Micro-Enterprise (ME), Ultra Poor Programme (Buniad), Seasonal Loan (SL), Agricultural Sector Micro-Credit (ASM), Microfinance Technical Support Project (MFTS), Microenterprise Development Project (MDP), MDP-AF(Additional Financing) etc. Following that, Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) renamed the components Jagoron, Agrasor, Buniad, MDP, MDP-AF and Sufolon in order to enhance the customers' economic situation by including them in various Income Generating Activities in the sectors like agriculture and livestock development.

The Microfinance Programme's core activities are divided into three categories. These are:

- 1. Samity Formation and Development.
- 2. Savings Collection and Mobilization.
- 3. Credit Operations for Income Genaration.

Present Status of Microfinance Programme

Under Microfinance Programme, a total of 3737 Samities are functional with 66240 members, including 65371 females and 869 males. The average group size has stayed nearly constant over the last five years, with 18-22 individuals in each group. The total outstanding of the Programme is Tk. 216,29,01,213 (Taka Two Hundred Sixteen Crore Twenty Nine Lac One Thousand Two Hundred and Thirteen) having Tk. 213,01,59,284 (Taka Two Hundred Thirteen Crore One Lac Fifty Nine Thousand Two Hundred and Eighty Four) with females and Tk. 3,27,41,929 (Taka Three Crore Twenty Seven Lac Forty One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty Nine) with males. Cumulative savings of the of the Samity members (includes General savings, Monthly savings scheme & Voluntary savings) are Tk. 90,92,83,696 (Taka Ninety Crore Ninety Two Lac Eighty Three Thousand Six Hundred and Ninety Six) up to June 2023, of which, Tk.84,53,39,885 (Taka Eighty Four Crore Fifty three Lac Thirty Nine Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty Five) saved by female members and Tk. 6,39,43,811 (Taka Six Crore Thirty Nine Lac Forty Three Thousand Eight Hundred and Eleven) by male members.

Like other Microfinance Organizations of the country, Gono Unnayan Prochesta has got a lot of support from Bangladesh Government. The Government channelled the fund through Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF), Bangladesh NGO Foundation (BNF) and Banks. Gono Unnayan Prochesta has received Tk.27,00,00,000 (Taka Twenty Seven Crore) from Banks for Agriculture and Micro-Enterprise (ME) development. Additionally, organization received Tk. 3,25,00,000 (Taka Three Crore and Twenty Five Lac) from Bangladesh NGO Foundation (BNF) in the name of 'Stimulus Loan' with 1% service charge at benificiaries level which Gono Unnayan Prochesta were to pay back with 4 % interest to Bangladesh NGO Foundation (BNF).

In Bangladesh evidence of Economic and Social effects is mixed and they are exposed to risks like sudden shocks, trends over time and seasonal changes. Microfinance contributes to smoothening consumption and reducing vulnerability. People have a number of capital assets which they draw upon to make their livelihood secured. Microfinance Programme is such a weapon that attacks poverty at its sources by increasing the household consumption expenditure of their family. On average some activities of Microfinance have had

positive socio-economic and cultural impact. Some impact of Microfinance Programme of Gono Unnayan Prochesta in its working areas can be mentioned as below:

- Ensure participation and empowerment of a considerable number of women in Microfinance Programme;
- It has positive effects on children education, health, nutrition and wellbeing of the elderly people;
- Households poverty is being reduced by increasing savings, borrowing money from the Microfinance Institution (MFI) and proper utilization of those money;
- Parallel to economical sustainability, the target family became aware about environmental impacts, safe sanitation and social protection;
- Increase mobility and establish network with other social institutions;
- Develop capacity to build leadership within themselves by their improved skills and knowledge;
- Some members specialy women became politicaly conscious, popular at local community and elected as Women Representatives at Local Government bodies in Gono Unnayan Prochesta's working areas;
- Improvement/Changes are visible in the areas like; increasing trend in saving attitude, foodsecurity, income generation, increased wages of the landless, diversification of employment sectors, asset increase and self-reliance.




Figure 1: Members Enrolment in 5 years





Figure 2: Members Savings in 5 years








Figure 4: Loan Outstanding last 5 years




Figure 5: Yearly surplus status (in lac Tk.)

Loan Products

Gono Unnayan Prochesta is operating Microfinance Programme by developing several loans and savings products as per the requirement and needs of the beneficiaries. The loan products are:

i) Buniad (Loan for Ultra Poor)

This loan is provided for the disadvantaged and landless people in society to conduct various income generating activities to sustain and maintain their livelihood. In the current fiscal year 2022-2023, a total of Tk. 370,51,000 (Taka Three Hundred Seventy Crore Fifty One Lac) was distributed among a total of 1,673 members where Tk. 3,70,21,000 (Taka Three Crore Seventy Lac Twenty One Thousand) to 1,672 female members and Tk. 30,000 to one male member.

ii) Jagoron (General Loan)

In order to promote income generating activities among low income people, Jagoron loans are provided from the range Tk.10,000 to Tk. 50,000. In the current 2022-2023 fiscal year, a total of Tk.107,43,31,000 (Taka One Hundred Seven Crore Forty Three Lac and Thirty one Thousand) was distributed among a total of 27,103 members. Within this,26,964 female members received Tk. 106,86,63,000 (Taka One Hundred Six Crore Eighty Six Lac and Sixty Three Thousand) and 139 male members received Tk.56,68,000 (Taka Fifty Six Lac and Sixty Eight Thousand).

iii) Agrosor (Microenterprise Loan)

'Agrosor' loan ranges from TK. 51,000 to more than Tk. 10 lac that are provided to people who are somewhat confident and progressive in society to run their various initiatives. In the financial year 2022-2023, a total of Tk. 216,10,91,000 (Taka Two Hundred Sixteen Crore Ten Lac and Ninety One Thousand) was distributed among a total of 17,545 members. Within this, Tk.212,60,01,000 (Taka Two Hundred Twelve Crore Sixty Lac and One Thousand) to 17,359 female members and Tk. 3,50,90,000 (Taka Three Crore Fifty Lac and Ninety Hundred) was distributed to 186 male members.

iv) Agrosor-MDP

Following the lending policies of Agorsor Loan, loans are distributed under two loan components, Agorsor MDP and MDP-AF, with the objectives to emphasize the production and processing sector, to provide loans in bulk to various businesses, and to encourage women entrepreneurs. Members are given loans in monthly installments ranging from Tk.1 lac to 5 lac.In 2022-2023 financial year, a total of Tk. 15,39,38,000 (Taka Fifteen Crore Thirty Nine Lac Thirty Eight Thousand) was distributed to a total of 977 members.

v) Sufolon (Agriculture Sector Loan)

Members who earn a living based on agriculture are provided with Sufolon loans as support loans, even if they have other loans, for the production of various crops, vegetables, fish farming and fattening of cattle. The term of this loan repayment is 6 months and the members repay this loan in a single installment after 6 months.

In the financial year 2022-2023, a total of Tk. 10,12,75,000 (Taka Ten Crore Twelve Lac Seventy Five Thousand) was distributed among a total of 4255 members.

vi) Somriddhi Programme (IGA Loan)

In Khalia union of Rajoir Upazila of Madaripur District, the organization provides IGA loans to members for various income generating activities through the Somriddhi Programme with the assistance of the Palli

Karma- Sahayak Foundation. The term of this loan repayment is from 12 to 18 months at the customer level. In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, a total of Tk. 9,76,98,000 (Taka Nine Crore Seventy Six Lac Ninety Eight Thousand) has been distributed among 485 female members under this project.

vii) Livelihood Improvement Loan (LIL)

In its operational area covered by the Somriddhi Programme, in addition to the IGA loan, the LIL Programme, i.e., the livelihood improvement loan programme for members, is operated on a very simple term. The term of this loan repayment at the customer level is 1 year to 2 years and the service charge is 4%. During the 2022-2023 financial year, a total of Tk.6,45,000 (Taka Six Lac Forty Five Thousand) has been distributed among 66 women members under this project.

viii) Asset Creation Loan (ACL)

In addition to IGA loans in the operational areas under the Somridhi project, Asset Creation Loan (ACL) Programme is being run with very easy terms for the members. The tenure of this loan-repayment at the customer level ranges from 1 to 2 years and the service charge is 4%. During the fiscal year 2022-2023, a total of Tk.6,45,000 (Taka Six Lac Forty Five Thousand) has been disbursed among 66 female members under this Programme.

ix) Livelihood Restoration Loan (LRL)

Due to the global pandemic of COVID-19, the economic activities of low income people in the country were disrupted, including their businesses and self employment activities. To keep the economic activities of the affected poor population going, the first and second phase activities of the Livelihood Restoration Loan (LRL) are being continued in the current year with the assistance of the Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation. For LRL, 1st phase loan ceiling at the member level is up to Tk.1 lac, the loan tenure is 2 years and grace period is 6 months with the service charge of 18%.

In the fiscal year 2022-2023, a total of Tk. 2,02,05,000 (Taka Two Crore Two Lac and Five Thousand) has been distributed to a total of 260 members, including Tk. 1,99,05,000 (Taka One Crore Ninety Nine Lac and Five Thousand) to 257 female and Tk. 3,00,000 (Taka Three Lac) among three male members. In the 2nd phase of LRL, the loan ceiling for this loan at the member level is up to Tk. 50,000, the loan tenure is 2 years and grace period is 6 months with the service charge of 4%.

In the fiscal year 2022-2023, a total of Tk. 1,15,70,000 (Taka One Crore Fifteen Lac and Seventy Thousand) has been distributed among 238 members, of which Tk. 1,15,20,000 (Taka One Crore Fifteen Lac and Twenty Thousand) to 237 female and Tk. 50,000 to one male member. In the 1st and 2nd phases of LRL, a total of Tk. 3,17,75,000 (Taka Three Crore Seventeen Lac and Seventy Five Thousand) has been distributed among a total of 498 members during the fiscal year 2022-2023.

x) Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (RAISE) Project

In the fiscal year 2022-2023, under the Programme called Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (RAISE) Project funded by Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation, Gono Unnayan Prochesta is conducting activities through 11 Branches, including 8 branches in the District of Madaripur and 3 Branches in the District of Gopalganj, to restore the initiatives of small entrepreneurs affected by COVID-19. Under this project, a loan of Tk. 3,00,00,000 (Taka Three Crores) was distributed among the members. Later, under this project, a loan of Tk.1,20,00,000 (Taka One Crore and Twenty lac) was distributed for young entrepreneurs from low income families. In addition, a loan of Tk. 1,25,70,000 (Taka One Crore Twenty Five Lac and Seventy Thousand) was distributed from the revolving fund of Gono Unnayan Prochesta. That is, a total of Tk. 5,45,70,000 (Taka Five Crore Forty Five Lac Seventy Thousand) has been distributed among 469 people

under this project. Of these, Tk. 5,18,70,000 (Taka Five Crore Eighteen Lac and Seventy Thousand) has been distributed among 449 female members and Tk. 27,00,000 (Taka Twenty Seven Lac) among 20 male members.

xi) Promoting Agricultural Commercialaization and Entreprise (PACE) Project

In 2022-2023 financial year, the organization is implementing this project through PKSF with the funding of the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) to expand the promising small enterprises in the country. In this project, two types of financial services have been started on a pilot basis: (i) Start Up Capital Loan for starting an enterprise for the new entrepreneurs, and (ii) Lease Financing for entrepreneurs to acquire capital equipment as per demand for enterprise expansion. A total of Tk. 25,00,000 (Taka Twenty Five Lac) has been distributed among 7 entrepreneurs under Start Up Capital Loan and Tk.25,00,000 (Taka Twenty Five Lac) among 8 entrepreneurs under Lease Financing.

xii) Cottage, Micro, Small and Medium (CMSM) Industry Restoration Loan funded by Bangladesh NGO Foundation (BNF)

During 2022- 2023 fiscal year, Gono Unnayan Prochesta has borrowed Tk.75,00,000 (Taka Seventy Five Lac) from BNF. This money will be used for restoration of Cottage, Micro, Small and Medium (CMSM) level Industries. This money was already distributed among 53 members over a period of 2 years, with a 6 month grace period.

xiii) Agrosor- Microenterprise Financing and Credit Enhancement (MFCE) Loan

The organization received the sanction letter of Tk.3,00,00,000(Taka Three Crore) from Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation with the financial support from Asian Development Bank (ADB) in June 2023. This loan will be distributed among members for various initiatives in the climate vulnerable areas of Madaripur, Gopalganj and Shariatpur District.

Types of Members' Savings

Gono Unnayan Prochesta collects three types of savings from all of its Samity members: General Savings, Voluntary Savings and Monthly Savings. At the beginning of the financial year, the organization's savings was Tk.75,22,64,296 (Taka Seventy Five Crore Twenty Two Lac Sixty Four Thousand Two Hundred and Ninety Six). In the 2022-2023 financial year, a total of Tk.73,12,88,364 (Taka Seventy Three Crore Twelve Lac Eighty Eight Thousand Three Hundred and Sixty Four) in savings was collected and Tk.57,42,68,964 (Taka Fifty Seven Crore Forty Two Lac Sixty Eight Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty Four) was refunded. At the end of the year, the savings was Tk.90,92,83,696 (Taka Ninety Crore Ninety Two Lac Eighty Three Thousand Six Hundred and Ninety Six). That is, the net savings have been increased by Tk.15,70,19,400 (Taka Fifteen Crore Seventy Lac Nineteen Thousand and Four Hundred) this year. The members build up their future capital and increase the financial stability of the organization's lending activities by these savings.

General Savings

Gono Unnayan Prochesta organized this general savings by collecting savings from each Samity Member on weekly basis. General savings are compulsorily collected along with loan installments. The amount of this savings is collected in any amount above at least Tk.50. In the 2022-2023 financial year, a total of Tk. 41,43,52,946 (Taka Forty One Crore Forty Three Lac Fifty Two Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty Six) was collected as savings and Tk.28,45,76,501 (Taka Twenty Eight Crore Forty Five Lac Seventy Six Thousand Five Hundred and One) was refunded. At the end of the year, the net savings was Tk.63,95,03,718 (Taka Sixty Three Crore Ninety Five Lac Three Thousand Seven Hundred and Eighteen) meaning the net savings increased by Tk.12,97,76,445 (Taka Twelve Crore Ninety Seven Lac Seventy Six Thousand Four Hundred and Fourty Five) this year.

Voluntary Savings

In addition to general savings, members can make voluntary savings if they wish. The amount of this savings is not fixed and is not compulsory. Members can withdraw this voluntary savings at any time if they want. At the beginning of the financial year, the organization's voluntary savings was Tk.12,58,19,173 (Taka Twelve Crore Fifty Eight Lac Nineteen Thousand One Hundred and Seventy Three). In the 2022-2023 financial year, a total of Tk. 26,78,52,478 (Taka Twenty Six Crore Seventy Eight Lac Fifty Two Thousand Four Hundred and Seventy Eight) was collected in savings and Tk.26,83,57,800 (Taka Twenty Six Crore Eighty Three Lac Fifty Seven Thousand and Eight Hundred) was refunded. At the end of the year, this savings stands at Tk.12,53,13,851 (Taka Twelve Crore Fifty Three Lac Thirteen Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty One). That is, net savings decreased by Tk.5,05,322 (Taka Five Lac Five Thousand Three Hundred and Twenty Two) this year.

Monthly Savings

Often, Samity members cannot go to the Bank to Deposit Pension Scheme (DPS) even if they want to go. Considering the future of the members, the organization has launched a 10 years monthly savings plan modeled after DPS. Members can deposit this monthly savings from Tk.100 to Tk.5,000 per month. At the beginning of the financial year, the organization's monthly savings was Tk.11,67,17,850 (Taka Eleven Crore Sixty Seven Lac Seventeen Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty). In the 2022-2023 financial year, a total of Tk. 4,90,82,940 (Taka Four Crore Ninety Lac Eighty Two Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty) was collected as savings and Tk.2,13,34,663 (Taka Two Crore Thirteen Lac Thirty Four Thousand Six Hundred and Sixty Three) was refunded. At the end of the year, the savings was at Tk.14,44,66,127 (Taka Forteen Crore Forty Four Lac Sixty Six Thousand One Hundred and Twenty Seven). That is, Monthly Savings increased by Tk.2,77,48,277 (Taka Two Crore Seventy Seven Lac Forty Eight Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy Seven) this year.

Gono Unnayan Prochesta strives to develop a savings habit among its members so that they can utilize the money during their emergency needs. In the year 2022-2023, the proportion of savings refund against savings collection is 78.53%. The total interest paid to the savers/depositors is Tk. 6,48,20,397 (Taka Six Crore Forty Eighty Lac Twenty Thousand Three Hundred and Ninety Seven) during the year 2022-23.

Collaboration with PKSF

Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) is the largest Financial Institution for NGO-MFI's. Gono Unnayan Prochesta has been a consistent partner organization of Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation since 1996. PKSF has continued funding and expanded its financial support to Gono Unnayan Prochesta's Microfinance Programme. PKSF provided sufficient fund and technical assistance to organization for increasing its branches and increasing loan outstanding in the field. Continuing with other projects in the year 2022-2023, Gono Unnayan Prochesta began some other new projects in collaboration with Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation, which are: Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (RAISE) Project, Microenterprise Financing & Credit Enhancement Project (MFCE) and Rural Microenterprise Transformation Project

(RMTP). Gono Unnayan Prochesta received a cumulative loan of Tk. 211,54,00,000 (Taka Two Hundred Eleven Crore and Fifty Four Lac) from Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation and repaid Tk. 158,06,03,326 (Taka One Hundred Fifty Eight Crore Six Lac Three Thousand Three Hundred and Twenty Six) to Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation up to June 2023. Gono Unnayan Prochesta received Tk.36,70,00,000 (Taka Thirty Six Crore Seventy Lac) as fund from Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation in this financial year. The loan balance was Tk.53,47,96,674 (Taka Fifty Three Crore Forty Seven Lac Ninty Six Thousand Six Hundred and Seventy Four). Along with the financing, PKSF provided assistance through Capacity Building training for Gono Unnayan Prochesta employees.

Partnership with Banks

Gono Unnayan Prochesta maintains a good relationship with the banks. The organization has received Tk. 236,67,48,888 (Taka Two Hundred Thirty Six Crore Sixty Seven Lac Forty Eight Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty Eight) as loan money from four private banks namely Trust Bank Ltd., South Bangla Agriculture & Commerce Bank Ltd., Midland Bank Ltd. and Southeast Bank Ltd. Up to June 2023, Tk. 212,15,91,359 (Taka Two Hundred Twelve Crore Fifteen Lac Ninety One Thousand Three Hundred and Fifty Nine) was paid to the Banks as per their schedule. The loan balance of banks is Tk. 24,51,57,529 (Taka Twenty Four Crore Fifty One Lac Fifty Seven Thousand Five Hundred and Twenty Nine) as on June 30, 2023.

Partnership with Bangladesh NGO Foundation (BNF)

Gono Unnayan Prochesta has been implementing Goat Rearing Project as an IGA, and Student Scholarship and Bangabandhu Student Scholarship Project from 2007. Bangladesh NGO Foundation (BNF) started their Microfinance Programme through partner organizations since May, 2021 considering the Covid-19 pandemic situation. The main objective of the project was to provide loan support to the Covid-19 affected people so that they can come back to their normal life through their small scale production related business.



BNF selected Gono Unnayan Prochesta as a partner of Microfinance Programme. In this financial year organization received Tk.75,00,000 (Taka Seventy Five Lac). Upto June 2023, Gono Unnayan Prochesta received from BNF a loan amount of Tk. 3,25,00,000 (Taka Three Crore Twenty Five Lac) and signed 2nd year agreement.

Income Generating Activity (IGA)

Poor people in Bangladesh are financially vulnerable because of limited income sources. If they make timely payments on their loans, then it will have a positive impact on their income and livelihood. Gono Unnayan Prochesta disburses loan among the beneficiaries against specific Income Generating Activities (IGA) for job creation. Some of the IGAs are: food processing, tailoring, cow rearing, beef fattening, goat rearing, mini poultry, hatchery, rice trading, as well as other trading activities such as paddy and watermelon cultivation, small businesses, fish trading, shop keeping, rickshaw-van pulling, carpentry, fire-wood trading, furniture business and street vendoring.

The status of borrowers and loan outstanding for larger IGAs such as Agriculture, Livestock, Fisheries, Food Processing, Small Trading and Transportation are summarized as below:




Figure: 6 IGA wise distribution of Loan during 2022- 2023

Sima Chana Chur, a success story

"Sima Begum's story is a testament to the power of determination, hard work, and the support of development organizations in transforming the lives of individuals and their communities. She has not only improved her family's economic situation but has also inspired others to overcome obstacles and strive for a better future."

Sima Begum, a resident of Char Muguria village in Madaripur Sadar Upazila, Madaripur District, is a remarkable woman who has achieved success through her chanachur (a popular snack in Bangladesh) factory. She is married to Billal Bepari for the past 20 years, and her husband used to work in someone else's chanachur factory. They lived in a small tin roofed house in their village with their in-laws and children. However, the irregular work at the factory often meant they struggled to make ends meet. Sima Begum and her husband have three daughters and one son, which added to their vulnerable situation. Billal's job at the factory was unstable, and he often went without pay.

Sima Begum was worried by thinking how to improve their circumstances but found no easy solutions. Sima Begum's husband also shared her concerns and wondered how they could start their own chanachur factory, considering the initial capital required.

One day, a relative from the neighboring house suggested that they could contact the local development organization, Gono Unnayan Prochesta, for guidance. They were told that if they became members of a women's Samity associated with the organization, they could apply for a loan after some time. Following this advice, Sima Begum became a member of the Nodir Kool Mahila Samity, whose society code was 1128, and her membership code was 7772. As a member, she started saving money and applied for a loan after a month.



During the pre-loan assessment interview, the branch manager discussed Sima Begum's interest and her husband's experience in running a chanachur factory. Impressed by her dedication and enthusiasm, the branch approved her for a loan of Tk.100,000. With this money, Sima Begum set up a small chanachur factory, bought some machines, and started her business. Her husband's previous experience in the field now proved to be valuable.

Initially, Sima Begum and her husband worked tirelessly, with late-night shifts and daytime sales efforts. Thanks to their hard work and determination, they began to see profits within the first month. Their income gradually increased, and they were able to address their financial struggles. Sima Begum started thinking about expanding the factory and applied for a second loan of Tk.150,000. With the second loan, she expanded her factory, purchased more machinery, and hired additional employees. As the production and sales grew, the factory became more profitable. Sima Begum's confidence grew as well. She began planning for further expansion and applied for a third loan, this time securing Tk. 2,000,000. With this funding, she further expanded her factory, invested in more machinery, and even started producing potato chips.

Today, Sima Begum's chanachur factory employs a good number of regular male and female workers from the locality. Sima's husband is no longer working in someone else's factory. Instead, he assists with the family business. Sima Begum is not only providing for her family but also investing in her children's education. Her eldest daughter is attending college, the middle daughter is in the 8th grade, and the youngest son is in the 2nd grade.

Sima Begum believes that her chanachur factory is not just a profitable business but also a means of contributing to national development by fulfilling the demand for delicious and nutritious food in the country. She envisions a modernized factory that can provide employment opportunities to many more people and contribute significantly to the nation's progress.

Success of Putul on Poultry Farm

"Putul Akhtar's success story serves as an inspiration to others in her community, demonstrating that raising indigenous chickens can be a viable and profitable livelihood option, leading to positive transformations in the lives of women and their families."

Putul Akhtar, a resident of Bagadi village in Chikundi Union of Shariotpur Sadar Upazila, Shariotpur District, is the wife of Monir Hosain Chowdhury. They have been married for 13 years. Monir Hosain Chowdhury works as a laborer on other people's land. They live in a small tin-roofed house in their ancestral village. Putul takes care of her inlaws, children, and household chores, with three older children to support, increasing expenses and no clear way to improve their livelihood.



One day, while browsing YouTube, Putul Akhtar came across a video about raising indigenous chickens. The idea sparked her interest, and she discussed it with her husband, who agreed. Initially, she borrowed Tk.300 from her father's house to purchase a few indigenous chickens and started raising them in her own courtyard. Within a month, the chickens started laying eggs. From those eggs, she hatched 15 chicks for the first time. These chicks began laying eggs after four months. Putul Akhtar successfully sold her chickens at a good price, making a profit. During this time, she learned about a nearby non governmental organization offering training in poultry farming. After participating in the training, Putul gained valuable knowledge about chicken farming but realized that she needed more financial resources to implement what she had learned. One day, following the advice of a neighbor, she reached out to the local branch of Gono Unnayan Prochesta. After becoming a member of the organization, she started saving money regularly. A month later, she applied for a loan.

During the pre-loan assessment, Putul Akhtar discussed her interest and experience in indigenous chicken farming. Impressed by her dedication and determination, she has been allocated the first loan of Tk. 35,000 in May 2020. With this money, she built a chicken coop and expanded her chicken farming operation. Over time, her flock grew to 150 chickens. She took meticulous care of her chickens and sought help from YouTube when she encountered poultry diseases. She successfully marketed her chickens to local buyers and traders, ensuring a steady income. With her income from chicken farming, Putul Akhtar not only repaid her loan but also built a small house, invested in a sewing machine, and purchased one acre of land for paddy cultivation. Her husband no longer had to work on other people's land, as they had their own source of income. Seeing Putul's success, many women in the area started raising chickens in their homes as well.

Putul Akhtar believes that through the support of Gono Unnayan Prochesta, she has brought positive changes to her family's life. She now supports her children's education and household expenses. She manages her finances efficiently, repaying her loans and saving money. She looks forward to further expanding her chicken farming business and continuing to improve her family's future.

"Aklima Telecom" a journey of inspiration

"Aklima Begum is now a successful entrepreneur who, together with her husband, is enjoying a comfortable life after overcoming hardships. She has become a role model in her community and is known for helping vulnerable women. Her life's journey serves as an inspiration to many."

Aklima Begum from Babumollahkandi village under the Shibchar Thana in Madaripur District is a struggling housewife who, due to her financial difficulties, was feeling hopeless about her future. When she couldn't find any ray of hope in her life's struggles, she came into contact with the Credit Officer of Shibchar Branch of Gono Unnayan Prochesta. In May 2020, she became a member of the Mohila Samity in Purbo Mollahkandi. Her initial goal was to start a tea stall, for which she took loan of Tk.50,000 as per the organization's rules. She used the earnings from the tea stall to repay the loan as per the stipulated terms and



also contributed to her family's modest income. In addition to running the tea stall, Aklima ventured into selling grocery goods, which further increased her income. On April 10, 2021, for the second time, she took a loan of Tk.100,000 from Gono Unnayan Prochesta and started the grocery business in full swing. Aklima's journey continued in her pursuit of a better life, and she expanded her business by adding an innovative idea of starting Flexiload and bKash services in her area. For this she took a loan of Tk.290000 for the third time during the November 2022. Slowly and steadily, "Aklima's bKash and Flexi load Shop" became a well known place in the neighborhood. Her daily transactions brought success to her family. She became self reliant and inspired the underprivileged community.

Suniti's success on Fish Farming

"Employment opportunities, combined with one's destiny, can bring about change. Fish farming is a profitable business. Seeing my success, others in the community have also been inspired to start their own venture."

Suniti Baidya, a resident of the Mushuria village in Ramshil Union, Kotailipara Upazila of Gopalganj District, started her conjugal life 36 years ago. Her husband, Rabi Baidya, worked on someone else's land. Their small, 300 square-foot house struggled to cover household expenses, and with four children to raise, financial difficulties continued to mount. Facing economic hardship, Suniti sought advice from her father, who suggested opening a tea and grocery store. He provided a small amount of capital as an initial investment. However, due to the limited funds, starting a shop was not feasible. Frustrated by financial constraints, Suniti began was exploring options. She learned about Gono Unnayan Prochesta, an organization locating its Branch Office in Bhangarhat that loans to its members. On 7 October 2022, after discussing with the organizers, Suniti became a member of the Mushuria Mahila Samity, (member Code 0090 and personal Code 2525).

As a member of the Samity, Suniti started saving money and, after a month, applied for a loan. During the pre-loan assessment, the branch manager, considering Suniti's interest, granted her a loan of Tk.75,000. With this money, Suniti opened a tea and grocery store of her own. She managed the store herself, and her husband assisted after finishing his work.

Gradually, Suniti's store started to generate income, and she used the earnings to regularly repay her loan installments. Seeing her success, Suniti thought to diversify her husband's income sources. Thus, on her second loan application, she secured Tk. 75,000 and invested it in leasing a large 'gher' for fish farming, supporting her husband in this new venture. The fish farming operation thrived alongside the grocery store.

With the additional income, Suniti could now afford not to send her husband to work on someone else's land. In their locality, she noticed many women engaging in small-scale fish farming in small ponds near their homes. Her financial stability, coupled with her new found knowledge and experience, allowed Suniti to purchase four acres of land for rice cultivation.

Today, Suniti's husband no longer needs to work on someone else's land, and their son has found employment in a company. Their younger son assists his father, while their two daughters have been married off. Reflecting on her journey, Suniti Baidya said, "There was a time when I couldn't afford a decent meal and struggled to provide for my children. Thanks to Gono Unnayan Prochesta, I've achieved a change in my family's fortunes through successful tea and



grocery store management, fish farming, and diversifying our income sources. Fish farming fulfills the local demand and has the potential to change my fate for the better. Employment opportunities, combined with one's destiny, can bring about change. Fish farming is a profitable business. Seeing my success, others in the community have also been inspired to start their own ventures."

Shahnaj Khatoon started fish farming and cattle farming

"Gono Unnayan Prochesta has helped me tremendously by providing a loan on easy terms during my difficult times. Now, I am doing very well, and there is no more struggle to cover the education expenses of my son and daughter."

This is the story of Shahnaj Khatoon, husband Nurul Afsar, from Barumchhara Village, under Pukuria Union of Banshkhali Upazila of Chattogram District. She had one son and one daughter, and at one point, the couple struggled to afford three meals a day, living in a small tin-roofed house. She, at that moment, joined as an active member of Gono Unnayan Prochesta branch of Barumchhara Mohila Samity (Code 284) and on October 10, 2021, she secured a loan of Tk. 50,000 for the cattle farming project on her own 12 decimal land at the homestead. A few days later, she began to earn income by selling the milk of those cows. Alongside regular loan repayments, the process of regular savings remained unaffected. After repaying Tk. 50,000 loan, she took a second loan of Tk. 1,00,000 on June 27, 2022, to expand her cattle farming project. Later on, she purchased more cows to expand the project further. For the third time, on April 11, 2023, she received a loan of Tk. 2,00,000 and started fish farming in her pond alongside cattle farming. Now, she is earning well from this endeavor. With her income, she is ensuring that her son and daughter receive a proper education, and she is gradually increasing her savings. Recently, she bought two more cows. Currently, she has eight cows,

including a calf, in her farm. These cows are producing 80-85 liters of milk daily, which she sells at a good price in the market. Her family's economic status has improved significantly, and she has gained respect in society like any other person.

The member stated, "Gono Unnayan Prochesta has helped me tremendously by providing a loan on easy terms during my difficult times. Now, I am doing very well, and there is no more struggle to cover the education expenses of my son and daughter." Her husband, Nurul Afsar, mentioned that seeing the success of her fish farming and cattle farming ventures, many people in the village have also started fish farming and cattle farming.

3.2 Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (RAISE) Project

The work of the RAISE Project of Gono Unnayan Prochesta began in October 2022. From the beginning of the programme to June 2023, Gono Unnayan Prochesta has continued to demonstrate its success in every programme through feasibility assessment of their project loans. Total employment of Bangladesh is 86.2% in the informal sector and 78% is associated with cottage and small enterprises, which play an important role in the sustainable economy (Labor Force Survey, 2016-17). Due to the impact of COVID-19, the informal sector has also been negatively affected, like other sectors. In this context, the Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) has taken the initiative to engage young people from low-income families in sustainable employment through the Recovery and Advancement of Informal Sector Employment (RAISE) Project.

The project aims to:

- Provide capacity building and loan support to entrepreneurs to revive/restore small enterprises affected by COVID-19 in urban and semi-urban areas;
- Increase the capacity and productivity of small entrepreneurs in the informal sector of the country;
- Engage young people from low-income families in sustainable employment through an apprenticeship programme.

It is important to note that this project has prioritized disadvantaged groups such as Dalits, Indigenous peoples, chars, haors, hill tracts, tea garden workers, coastal areas, and disabled (PWD) youth. The project provides 6 month training to young people through a master-apprentice model, establishing them as entrepreneurs in the informal sector. This will help to mainstream the country's dropout and unemployed youth, thereby contributing to socio-economic development. Under the project, 7,000 master-craftspersons will provide training to 35,000 young apprentices through the "ustad-shagird" model. At the same time, the Project Implementation Unit (PIU) will provide technical and soft skills training to these young apprentices. Overall, the project aims to free 175,000 small entrepreneurs from 'low level technology trap' and engage in sustainable employment, thereby helping to develop the country's socio-economic landscape.













Target population of the project implemented

The project targets young people who are members of families that have received loans from PKSF, small entrepreneurs who are relatively backward, and disadvantaged groups such as Dalits, Indigenous people and young and small entrepreneurs with disabilities. With technical and financial assistance from PKSF and the World Bank, Gono Unnayan Prochesta has been implenting RAISE Project through 11 Branches under Madaripur and Gopalganj District.

Activity procedure

- Prepare a preliminary list of entrepreneurs who are affected by COVID-19 and provide them with loans to help them restart their businesses.
- Conduct financial assessments of the entrepreneurs and provide them with training on their businesses.
- Expand the PIU project, improve the quality of the project's activities, increase the entrepreneurs' business knowledge and skills, market the project's products, create markets for the products, teach the members how to keep monthly and annual income and expenses' records for their businesses, and develop a future action plan for the businesses.
- Identify the problems with traditional business management practices and work to establish grassroots businesses in a more modern and institutional way.

Implemented Activities

- From December 2022 to March 2023, three months training on "Risk Management and Business Continuity" with 300 participants in 15 batches, was successfully completed.
- 25 apprentices engaged through the "Guru-shishya" model by 13 gurus/masters.
- Life skills Development Training for five days.
- A two day orientation held for 13 gurus.
- 25 apprentices/interns have found self-employment by working in various factories or starting their own businesses after completing their six-month training.

The accumulated loan distribution through the Project is Tk. 6,46,00,000 (Taka Six Crore Forty Six Lac) and the loan balance as of June 2023 is Tk. 4,34,55,082 (Taka Four Crore Thirty Four Lac Fifty Five Thousand and Eighty Two).

Sumaiya, transformed as an independent business woman

"Sumaiya's story is one of unwavering determination, hard work, and self-reliance. Despite facing numerous challenges, she persevered and transformed her life, setting an example for all of us."

Sumaiya had to get married at the young age of 17 due to financial difficulties in her father's household. She married a trolly driver and moved into her husband's home, along with her motherin-law. Sumaiya's husband and her father-in-law both had good incomes, and their family life was going well. In 2015, Sumaiya gave birth to a son, and two years later, she had a daughter. Like many other Bengali brides, she continued to work in her in-laws' home, taking care of household chores. Suddenly, the outbreak of COVID-19 disrupted their lives. Sumaiya's husband's work came to a halt, and her father-in-law's decorating work also stopped. In the midst of this crisis, Sumaiya's father-in-law was attacked by COVID-19. With two breadwinners in the family unable to work, their situation became dire. Additionally, one of the family members was infected with the virus. It was a challenging time. Sumaiya struggled to provide for her family while taking care of her young children, even if it meant



going without food at times. Gradually, as efforts to control the spread of COVID-19 continued, life started returning to normal. People resumed their usual work, and Sumaiya's husband went back to driving his trolly. However, due to her father-in-law's weakened health after battling COVID-19, he couldn't work. This is how their family continued to function. But then, a tragic accident changed everything. While Sumaiya's husband was pulling his trolly, an unexpected collision occurred with a speeding truck. Sumaiya's husband suffered severe injuries and was rushed to the Gopalganj Sadar Hospital. The medical staff there assessed his condition and referred him to Dhaka Medical College Hospital, recognizing the gravity of his injuries.

In Dhaka, doctors discovered that Sumaiya's husband had suffered fractures in three different places along his spine, requiring surgery. This marked a turning point in Sumaiya's life. She had to leave her children behind and spend five long months at Orthopedic Hospital in Dhaka, tending to her husband's medical needs.

During this time, Sumaiya's determination and unwavering mental strength became evident. Despite the extreme difficulties, she took care of her young children, even if it meant going without food at times. As efforts to control COVID-19 gradually succeeded, and with the support of her father-in-law's, Sumaiya was introduced to a project of Gono Unnayan Prochesta that would change her life. Gono Unnayan Prochesta team was running a skill development programme in partnership with a Raise Project worker. Upon hearing about Sumaiya's struggles and witnessing her determination, they decided to give her a chance.

Sumaiya attended a Dress Making and Tailoring training programme from January to June 2023, initiated by Raise Project, as a student of the 2nd batch. Her enthusiasm for learning and dedication to her work impressed the project team. They saw her potential and offered her a job as a trainer for the programme. Sumaiya started teaching others and quickly became a skilled dressmaker herself. She received a monthly income of Tk.2,000 from this work and used her earnings to buy a sewing machine. Inspired by her mentor, Sumaiya did not stop at teaching and started her own small business in garment making. She began by making three piece out fits for Eid-ul-Fitr, earning a profit of Tk.15,000 and she continued her clothing business and made a profit of nearly Tk.20,000. Sumaiya's total earnings from the project, monthly income, and her own business amounted to Tk. 65,000 in just six months.

With a dream to establish herself as a successful entrepreneur and a determination to work tirelessly, Sumaiya's journey transformed her from a housewife into an independent business woman. Her earnings not only provide for her family but also earned her respect and self-confidence. When given the opportunity, she aspires to expand her business to include clothing and tailoring.

3.3 Livestock (goat breeding, poultry) and Pisciculture

The Fisheries and livestock programme provide a variety of activities to help marginalized poor, farmers, and small shopkeepers in the community achieve sustainable income. These activities include providing goats and cows for rearing, goat insemination, poultry rearing, and pond fish culture. The program also helps to develop animal protein, milk, and nutritional foods for the community. By increasing financial capacity and making life easier, these efforts help to improve the lives of beneficiaries.

a) Goat Breeding Centre:

Goat breeding is an important part of the livestock programme. Gono Unnayan Prochesta Breed Center is a reliable resource for providing assistance in the area. Eleven crossbreed bucks were used to improve the breed of goats in the Rajoir and Bajitpur mixed farms.

The impact of goat breeding activities

Some of the impacts could be observed in rural area, that can be mentioned as below:

- Cross breeded improved goats are found in the working area that are encouraging local family members to build small scale goat farms.
- Availability of animal protein and milk at reasonable price in the community markets.
- Improved insemination opportunities in the working area.
- Developed inter sharing knowledge to increase goat rearing and facilities.

b) Cow Rearing

Gono Unnayan Prochesta has established a small scale cow rearing demonstration farm to encourage cow rearing at family level in the community.

d) Pisciculture/Pond Fish Culture

To provide nutrition and income, many villagers and Samity members in the community are involved in fish culture in ponds. The programme is expected to benefit the villagers in a number of ways, including providing them with a source of food, income, and employment. Gono Unnayan Prochesta 's own 15 ponds covering 4.49 acres of water area are being used for fish cultivation. The fish varieties cultivated this year include Ruhi, Katla, Mrigel, Common Carp, Glass Carp, Silver Carp, Black Carp, and Bata. In this year (2022-2023), fish culture has been promoted through the use of 1 kg of fish spawn, 975,060 fish fry, and 220 kg of fish fingerlings. Indigenous technologies have been used to create a favorable environment for fish culture.

Challenges of pisciculture/ pond fish culture

There are some challenges to implement the pisciculture/pond fish culture such as: old and damaged Ponds, lack of Labor, High Feed Costs, Fear of thieves, Lack of modern Fish Kits, insufficient running kits. By addressing these challenges, Pisciculture/Pond Fish Culture can become a more sustainable and profitable business.

3.4 Afforestation Programme

The afforestation programme was initiated by Gono Unnayan Prochesta in 1989-90 fiscal year to engage poor, widowed, and destitute women in the food for works programme to improve the environment by planting trees. The World Food Programme (WFP) assisted the programme, which involved 673 caretakers who planted 193,173 saplings along 241.02 kilometers of 58 roads (on both sides) in Madaripur, Gopalganj, and Shariotpur Districts.



The government created a deed in 1995 to share the benefits after the trees were harvested. The sharing arrangement is as follows:

Government Revenue: 20%
Upazila Porishad: 25%
Union Parishad: 5%
Beneficiary Group: 40%

• GUP: 10%

Over time, the planted saplings have grown into mature trees. These trees are now a valuable asset to the community and also help to support the environment.

In 2022, 41 kilometers of mature trees were sold due to road expansion. Additionally, 15.5 kilometers of trees along the roadside were damaged by river erosion. As a result, Gono Unnayan Prochesta is now responsible for caring for the trees along 184.52 kilometers of roads in three Districts.

The ongoing activities of the programme include:

- Regular supervision of the Roadside trees;
- Meetings with the Caretakers;
- Communication with Roadside villagers;
- Liaison with the Upazila Porishad on related matters.

The Afforestation Programme has been a success in improving the environment and providing economic opportunities for poor women. It is an important example of how community based projects can be used to achieve sustainable development goals.

Impacts of Roadside Afforestation

- The roots of the trees planted under the roadside afforestation programme protect the roads from erosion.
- The trees planted under the programme is a significant environmental development effort for the community. The shades of the trees provide relief from the sun and rain for villagers and travelers.
- The planted trees are a valuable asset for the community and the Upazila Porishad.

Challenges of Roadside Afforestation

- The deed (agreement) does not specify the cost of maintenance and supervision. As a result, Gono Unnayan Prochesta bears the cost of afforestation related activities from its own funds.
- Beneficiaries are held responsible if the planted trees are damaged or cut down during road widening, maintenance, construction of new houses or infrastructure, or electrification.
- There is confusion about ownership between the Afforestation Project personnel and the roadside householders of the planted trees.
- The deed does not clearly state the conditions for the disposal of mature trees with the approval of the local authority. This has obstructed the settlement of benefits among the beneficiaries.

3.5 Goat Rearing Project funded by BNF

Goat Rearing as an IGA for Poor Women (Chagol Palon Karmasuchi) project is supported by Bangladesh NGO Foundation (BNF) since 2008, now being implemented in 2 Unions of Chandanish, 2 unions of Patia and 3 Unions of Anwara Upazilas of Chattogram District. The project's 11th (eleventh) round was completed in June 2023. The objective of the project is to enhance the economic condition of the local community. Under this project major activities are: a) organizing training for the selected Extreme Poor Women of the community on goat rearing. b) Distribution of goats to 25 Poor Women of these three Upazilas. Total budget of this project is Tk. 3,00,000 (Taka Three lac) only. By this time 25 new beneficiaries were trained and they were provided with goats (two goats for each beneficiary).

4. Social Programme

4.1 Peace Centre

'Shanti Kendra', also known as the Peace Center is a special programme of Gono Unnayan Prochesta. This center was established in 1982 by the founder of the organization, Mr. Mohammad Ataur Rahman, in Khalia village of Rajoir Upazila in Madaripur District. The Center is located in the south west region of the country, about 85 km from Dhaka. It has a beautiful garden, pond, library, training center, a mosque and a temple, and a beautiful guesthouse. The place can also be easily identified through Google website as a tourist/notable spot in Rajoir, Madaripur. The main reason for establishing the Peace Center is to:

- Eradicate various forms of violence in society through raising public awareness
- Establish justice
- Organize meetings and discussions to establish social peace
- Create connections to build/improve personal relationships, so that justice, equality and peace prevail in the family, society and state.

Peace Center Activities

As part of the Peace Center activities, training, seminars, and workshops are organized to create a nonviolent environment and improve behavioral manners. These activities are attended by students, teachers, religious person, representatives of the people, and employees of private organizations. The center offers services to organize meetings, seminars, workshops, and trainings for any individual or organization, subject to payment on a certain rate; and to conduct tours at the government, private, NGO, company, and other institutes and individuals.

The following activities are being conducted under this center:

- Dishwari Children School (for low income families);
- Community Library (Ataur Rahman Memorial Peace Library);
- Develop Volunteerism;
- Work and Education Camp for Youth.

In December 2022 and January 2023, the soldiers of Bangladesh Army's Barisal Cantonment used the center for a six week winter exercise. During this time, 700 soldiers led by a colonel stayed here and participated in the programme.

Mohammad Ataur Rahman Memorial Peace Library

Mohammad Ataur Rahman Memorial Peace Library is a public library named after the late Mohammad Ataur Rahman, the founder and former executive director of Gono Unnayan Prochesta. It is known as the "lighthouse of knowledge" in the area. The library has a wide variety of books on peace and development issues, as well as other books, journals, and newspapers that are suitable for teenagers, youth, and the elderly.

The library is open from 5:00 pm to 8:00 pm daily. On average, 15 to 20 students visit the library to study each day, and sometimes students from afar come to the library to gather important information from the newspapers that are kept there. This helps to create an interest in education and reading among local teenagers, youth and adults. They can learn a variety of new information.

4.2 Disaster Management Programme

Gono Unnayan Prochesta has always been there for the victims of disasters. The organization has been involved in disaster management activities since 1972, and in 1988, it received the "Atish Dipankar Seba

Padak" for its extensive work during the country's devastating flood. In 1991, the cyclone and tidal surge caused widespread damage in the country's south and southeast regions, and the organization provided services by fully participating in that disaster. Gono Unnayan Prochesta's operational area, Southwest and southeast regions of the country both area is known as flood prone areas. Moreover, southeast region is a coastal area, so various disasters such as tidal surges and landslides often occur. In the country's southwest region, such as in Madaripur and the greater Faridpur and Gopalganj areas, arsenic, excessive iron and salinity in groundwater are increasing, as a long term disaster.

During the period 2022-23, no major disaster occurred in the organization's operational area. The organization's staff have linkage and relationships with local dignitaries, including local communication systems, infrastructure, institutional and non-institutional levels of individuals, social committees and organizations, due to working in the area for a long time. If any disaster occurs in the operational area, the organization is prepared to work jointly with various national and international organizations; this issue is included as part of the organization's work plan. Gono Unnayan Prochesta participates in various disaster management programmes in coordination with government and non-government institutions at the District and Upazila levels. The organization is listed with Plan International and the World Food Programme Bangladesh Office as a strategic partner to work in its operational area during disasters. In addition, Gono Unnayan Prochesta is a member of the country's important disaster network "Nirapod".

4.3 ENRICH (Somriddhi) Programme

In August 2014, the Somriddhi Programme was introduced in Khalia Union of Rajoir Upazila, Madaripur District, with financial and technical assistance from PKSF. This is a new dimension in development techniques.

Somriddhi Programme is to adopt inclusive policies in all areas of development, taking into consideration the multidimensionality of poverty. Multidimensional poverty includes economic, social and environmental indicators. The main objective of this programme is to ensure the best use of the current resources and capabilities of a family and to take initiatives to increase its resources and capabilities appropriately.

This multidimensional effort provides services from the beginning of human life to the end of life. It includes health care, education, food and nutrition, social development, financial services, infrastructure development, youth development activities and social degradation. Therefore, most of the people of the Union are involved in Somriddhi Programme in various ways. Through this programme, the work of integrating the backward people of the society into the mainstream of society is ongoing. Somriddhi serves those who need health care, educational assistance, youth development, energetic (uddomi) member, women headed and helpless families.

As part of family development activities, there are various types of service activities such as: cattle, poultry farming at the family level, vegetable cultivation in the backyard of the house, various types of cultivation assistance to increase income, fish farming, commercially income generating activities etc.

As social interventions, there are activities to free the society from various degradation, to create public awareness by celebrating various national and international days, to form committees at various levels and to use and strengthen the committees to accelerate social progress in a positive way. Additionally it assists in the construction and renovation of various types of infrastructure locally. In this financial year, 28,836 people from 5,715 households in 19 villages of Khalia Union are involved in this programme.

ENRICH Team

The total number of employees under Somriddhi Programme is 49 where 43 female and six are male employees. In Khalia Somriddhi branch, there is one Somriddhi Programme Coordinator, two Health Officers, one Social Development Officer, one Entrepreneurship Development Officer, one Monitoring Information System Officer, one Education Supervisor, twelve Health Inspectors and thirty Teachers as employees. Additionally two MBBS doctors are working part time to operate the regular Satellite Clinic. Everyone is fulfilling their assigned duties and responsibilities in a smooth manner.

Special Credit Services

Besides other development activities, three types of credit services are offered through the Khalia Somriddhi Branch. These are:

- Income Generating Activity (IGA) Loan, Maximum service charge 24% in a decreasing manner.
- Livelihood Improvement Loan (LIL), maximum service charge 8% in a decreasing manner.
- Asset Creation Loan (ACL), maximum service charge 8% in a decreasing manner.

This IGA loan can be taken as a primary loan and LIL or ACL can be taken as a support loan for the primary loan. Currently, the people of Khalia Union are able to improve their quality of life by getting the above loan facilities and become entrepreneurs by adopting diverse income generating activities and become more prosperous and wealthier.

To improve the knowledge and skills of members for implementing Income Generating Activity (IGA) loans, regular subject based training is being organized. Local subject matter specialists from the Upazila are hired as resource persons to successfully conduct the training sessions. As a result, members acquire good knowledge and skills on project based topics, and due to the good relationship with the Upazila administration, it is now easy to get the help of Upazila Officers in the income generating project of the loan recipient in case of any damage, disease, or illness, and immediate solutions can be found. In addition to loan distribution, meetings are held at the Samity level every week to improve the skills and awareness of members. Various social problems and motivating topics are discussed in those meetings. In the fiscal year 2022-2023, 100 female members have received IGA training, including 50 in improved dairy farming, 25 in improved poultry farming and 25 in improved vegetable cultivation.

In the fiscal year 2022-2023, a total of Tk. 14,83,55,000 (Taka Forteen Crore Eighty Three Lac and Fifty Five Thousand) has been distributed to 1,426 female members, including 485 members under the IGA project, 66 members under the Livelihood Improvement Loan (LIL) and 103 members as Asset Creation Loan (ACL) recipients. In the fiscal year 2022-2023, members have saved a total of Tk. 1,99,96,162 (Taka One Crore Ninety Nine Lac Ninety Six Thousand One Hundred and Sixty Two). As on 30 June 2023, the outstanding loan at Khalia Somriddhi Branch was Tk.10,64,08,077 (Taka Ten Crore Sixty Four Lac Eight Thousand and Seventy Seven).

Special Savings Scheme for the Ultra-poor Households

As part of its social activities, Gono Unnayan Prochesta's Somriddhi Programme has a Special Savings Service. Families in Khalia Union with female heads and disabled members, especially the ultra poor, are eligible for this type of Special Savings Scheme. Each family is advised to open a savings account with a scheduled bank for at least Tk.1,000 per month for two years and to deposit a certain amount of money in that savings account every month.

At the end of the stipulated time, Gono Unnayan Prochesta Somriddhi Programme will provide the saver with a grant equal to the total amount saved up to Tk. 20,000. The condition is that the money must be used

to create an asset so that the poor family becomes the owner of an asset through small savings, creates a new source of income for the family, and ultimately creates a respectable position for it in society. It is necessary to ensure the purchase or use of assets such as land, farm animals/cattle, or other assets, subject to discussion. The goal is to encourage poor families to be economical and to show them an example of how they can one day become the owners of a satisfactory amount of money through small savings.



In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, a total of 5 people were assisted under the Special Savings Programme. The total savings of 5 people who were given grants was Tk. 1,00,000 (Taka One lac) and Tk. 1,00,000 (Taka One lac) was given as grants from Gono Unnayan Prochesta Somriddhi Programme, so the said 5 members are now the owners of assets worth Tk. 2,00,000 (Taka Two lac). In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, including 5 people, a total of 24 special savings members have been provided financial assistance of Tk. 4,65,615 (Taka Four lac Sixty Five Thousand Six Hundred and Fifteen) through this programme and 24 families have become the owners of assets worth Tk. 9,64,235 (Taka Nine lac Sixty Four Thousand Two Hundred and Thirty Five).

Bithika's struggle

"Bithika Barai, aged 38 years of Ullabari Village under Khalia Union in Rajoir Upazila of: Madaripur District, is a housewife and her husband Sukanto Barai, a day labour, used to work for a living. They have a son and a daughter; together, as a family, they were leading a peaceful and happy life. Bithika and Sukanto didn't own any land for cultivation, but they had a five decimal residential plot. They sustained their livelihood by working as sharecroppers on nearby farmland."

In 2015, Sukanto Barai suddenly passed away due to a stroke. At that time, their son was four years old, and their daughter was just one and a half years old. In this difficult situation, Bithika took responsibility for her two young children. She faced the challenge of managing the household on her own while dealing with the grief of losing her husband. Adjacent to their house was a cement bag manufacturing factory. Bithika began working there, earning a daily wage of Tk.200, to make ends meet. She struggled to provide for her children, but with determination, she continued to work hard to support them.



As part of the Somriddhi Programme of Gono Unnayan Prochesta in the 2019-2020 fiscal year, Bithika was selected as the head of a needy and female led family. Following the guidelines of this special savings program, she saved Tk.1,000 per month and deposited 20,000 Taka in two years. Additionally, under the financial and technical support of Palli Karma- Sahayak Foundation, she received an additional grant of Tk.20,000. This amount Tk.40,000, showed her determination to create a source of wealth and hope for a better future. Using the Tk.40,000 Bithika leased 10 decimal of land with the intention of generating a regular income. She cultivates rice on this land, yielding 8-10 mounds of rice per year. Besides farming, she also raises ducks and chickens at home. Bithika is content with her achievement.

Youth Development

We all know that today's youth will lead the country and society in the future. Gono Unnayan Prochesta is running a programme called "Unnayan-e Jubo Samaj" (Youth in Development) to promote the development of the youth community. The programme aims to support the mental development of youth by engaging them in various activities at the local level. It also encourages youth members to participate in education institutions, political circles, and the resolution of social problems. The programme encourages youth to work to eliminate social evils such as child marriage, drug addiction, violence, extremism, and eve-teasing. Under the Somriddhi Programme, various activities are implemented to motivate the youth folk. Training is provided to youth to develop their self awareness and leadership.

In 2022-2023 fiscal year, a video-based training titled "Swopno Amar Uddyokta Hobo" (My Dream is to be an Entrepreneur) was organized to train youth members to become entrepreneurs. Subject based training is also provided to create employment opportunities for unemployed youth and to engage youth in Income Generating Activities. After training, initiatives are taken to connect them with jobs or subject based work.

Training on "Swopno Amar Uddyokta Hobo" at a glance:

- Number of youths participated in the training: 15 Female & 85 Male.
- Number of youths expressed interest to become entrepreneur after receiving training: 8 Female & 27
 Male.
- Number of youths expressed interest to take loan after receiving training on entrepreneurship: 4 Female & 19 Male.
- Number of youths started project after getting training and with the loan received: 1 Female & 1 Male.
- Number of youths started project after getting training and with own fund, 3 Female & 8 Male.
- Number of youths started project after getting training with loan and own fund as capital, 4 Female & 9 Male.

In addition, Ward Youth Coordination Meetings, Union Youth Coordination Meetings, Union Youth Fairs, and Annual Sports and Cultural Competitions are being organized at the local level. This will help young brothers and sisters to play a role in the development of their families and society in their respective fields. In summary, the programme aims to empower youth to become productive members of society.



ENRICH Centre (Somriddhi Kendro)

There is a lack of infrastructure for social activities in our country, and its emptiness is noticeable at the village level. Establishment of Ward ENRICH Centre/Somriddhi Kendro is one of the most important aspects of the Somriddhi Programme. Many activities are implemented around the center. Since there is no other infrastructure in the Local Government Structure other than the Union Council Building at the village level, the establishment of a Somriddhi Center in each ward has made it a gathering place for that village and a place for the ward member and reserved female members to sit, which strengthens social activities and organizations.

There is an eleven member Executive Committee for each Somriddhi Kendro, and the Committee is headed by the Elected Union Council Member of that ward, along with local senior members, dignitaries, teachers, and youth members of that ward. As per the guidelines, Gono Unnayan Prochesta and PKSF jointly established the Somriddhi Kendro house, after motivating the local people, a suitable piece of land is arranged with their assistance and later a brick walled Tin shed Somriddhi Kendro has been built. There are 9 Somriddhi Kendro in Khalia Union, constructed by Gono Unnayan Prochesta in 2017 and those were repaired in 2022-2023.

In the Somriddhi Kendro, all local arbitrations are held in which the ward member and reserved female member organize arbitrations to resolve local problems. Apart from this, it also organizes various government and non-government training and meetings. In Eight (08) Somriddhi Kendro of the Somriddhi Programme, a part time education support center is being operated and in One (01) center, a library has been created with the initiative of local youth members and the organization's employees. Here, the youth and the elderly are

happy to have the opportunity to read regularly. Apart from this, activities such as organizing and conducting Ward Senior Meetings and distributing maintenance allowances, conducting regular Satellite and Static Clinics as per plan, conducting Blood Group tests, organizing Nutrition Camps, etc. are also conducted.

The Eleven member Ward Coordination Committee meets every two months and identifies the problem of that Ward and takes steps to resolve them, such as: preventing Child Marriage, freeing the youth from harmful drug addiction, helping poor girls to study, taking measures to prevent eve teasing, and motivating the two parties to come to a normal relationship in family quarrels and disputes. In Somriddhi Kendro, a Ward Youth Coordination Meeting is held in every two months, where a work plan is taken to work on solving various problems of the youth, such as: organizing various games and sports for the youth, motivating other youth to refrain from bad activities, helping unemployed youth to get jobs or business through training, playing a role in preventing eve teasing or child marriage, and taking care of others. The Somriddhi Kendro is a social asset for everyone in that ward.

ENRICHed Home

Motivated by the slogan "No one will be left behind" and with the objective to transform every home in the Somriddhi Union of Khalia, the Somriddhi Programme initially identified 50 families who were interested in having a prosperous home. These families had open spaces in their homes where they could raise livestock, poultry and grow vegetables and fruits. This would allow them to generate some additional income and meet their own nutritional needs.

The concept of a Somriddhi Bari (Prosperous Home) arose from the effort to ensure the optimal use of the resources of each homestead and increase its productivity. In these homes, various economic activities are

carried out, including livestock raising, poultry and pigeon raising, vegetable production, planting of lemon, jute, data, fruits, medicinal plants and fish farming for the purpose of generating regular income. Most prosperous homes produce environmentally friendly vermicompost fertilizer from the manure of livestock and birds. Each prosperous home has a sanitary latrine and many have their own tube wells. To date, a total of 50 ordinary homesteads have been transformed into Somriddhi Bari under the programme.

Rehabilitation of Extremely Vulnerable Active Members

A Special Social Programme is underway under the Somriddhi Programme called "Rehabilitation of Active Members." The neglected and extremely poor people of the community are the active members of the rehabilitation programme under the Somriddhi Programme in this area. Everyone has the right to live with human dignity, but due to social and environmental conditions, many have fallen from that place of dignity. The rehabilitation of active members is very important as a special programme with the financial and technical assistance of PKSF.

It is expected that the rehabilitated member will create assets worth Tk. 1,00,000 (Taka One lac) by verifying the choice and reality of that member. It is important that regular income comes from that asset and sustainability can be ensured.

The staff of the Somriddhi Programme regularly monitor the active members to help them escape from poverty cycle. It is ensured that they meet and talk to each rehabilitated member three days a week to keep track on their progress.

Since beginning of the Somriddhi Programme, a total of eight active members (four female and four male) have been rehabilitated in the last few years, who have now been able to establish themselves in a stable condition.

Banecha Begum succeeded to live with self respect by leaving begging

"Banecha no longer considers herself a beggar but rather a successful individual. She believes that without the assistance from Gono Unnayan Prochesta, she might have had to beg for a lifetime."

Banecha Begum, husband Monir Bepari from Boulgram Village of Khalia union under Rajoir Upazila in Madaripur District. She was a housewife, and her husband, Monir Bepari, was a day laborer. They lived in a house with only five decimal land beyond their residence, and they didn't own any other land. After their marriage, they had a son. When the son was 6 month old, Monir Bepari abandoned Banecha without informing her of his whereabouts. Banecha and her father searched extensively for Monir Bepari but couldn't find him; he had already started a new family with someone else.



In this situation, Banecha became destitute, and her husband's abandonment left her with the responsibility of the household. During this time, she tried to find work and supported her son, but despite seeking help from relatives and neighbors, she couldn't find any means to sustain herself. As a result, she resorted to begging in a distant village, which caused her a lot of distress.

During this period, Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation included Banecha Begum as a beneficiary in the

rehabilitation package of Somriddhi Programme in 2016-17 fiscal year. She was provided with financial and technical support on the condition that she would give up begging and engage in an Income Generating Activity. She received a grant of Tk.100,000 (Taka One lac) as part of this support.

With a portion of this grant, Banecha Begum bought 10 decimal land and used the remaining money to start a small grocery store next to her house. The income from the land, the shop, and her poultry and goat farming helped her maintain her family's well being. Currently, she has assets worth Tk.15,00,000 (Taka Fifteen lac).

Banecha no longer considers herself a beggar but rather a successful individual. She believes that without the assistance from Gono Unnayan Prochesta, she might have had to beg for a lifetime. Now, she lives with dignity and strives to provide her son with an education, nurturing him to become a responsible citizen of the country.

Sports & Cultural Programme

The Annual Sports and Cultural Competition was held in Khalia Union of Rajoir Upazila on 15 February 2023. The competition was organized by the Somriddhi Programme and Senior Citizen Programme, with the financial and technical assistance of PKSF. The competition was attended by students, guardians, members of the "Unnayan-e Jubo Samaj" and senior members of the after school support centers in the Union. It is to be noted that before organizing the final event of the Annual Sports and Cultural Competition 2023, Ward based competitors were held locally in 9 Wards of the Union



and 3 competitors were initially selected through competitions in each event in the final round. Competitions were organized with the participants of 09 Wards at the field of Khalia Rajaram Institute and the office premises of Somriddhi Programme.

Speaking at the event as the chief guest, Rajoir Upazila Nirbahi Officer (UNO) Mr. Md. Anisuzzaman said: "There is a great need for sports and cultural events for a healthy mind and body. If such sports and cultural events are organized by various non-government organizations and individuals along with the government,

the physical and mental development of children, adolescents and youth will take place, they will be away from bad thoughts and various addictions, a competitive spirit will be created among them, the practice of tolerant mentality will take place and opportunities for leadership development will be created among them."

Day Observation

World Environment Day

World Environment Day, 2023 was celebrated in Khalia Union of Rajoir Upazila in Madaripur District on June 5, 2023 with the support from PKSF. The theme of the event was "Let's all join hands to solve plastic pollution." Youth members of the Union participated in the human chain and discussion meeting on this significant day. Out of 130 youth members, 55 Female and 75 Male members participated in the events.



Joining in the human chain and discussion meeting as chairperson, the Executive Director of GUP said, "We all need to reduce the use of plastic products in order to protect the balance of the environment. Otherwise, crop production will be hampered in the country's lands and this beautiful environment will be destroyed. Along with that, there will be a shortage of clean air, light and safe water for us to live. This earth will become unfit for habitation, the ozone layer will be destroyed and the ultraviolet rays of the sun will cause the death of the animal kingdom on the earth."

International Mother's Day

The International Mother's Day 2023 was celebrated in Khalia Union in the fiscal year 2022-2023 with the support of PKSF. On the occasion, a human chain and a discussion meeting were held. The students and mothers of the children of the evening education support center of the Somriddhi Programme participated in the discussion meeting after the human chain.



At the meeting, children shared a variety of mixed feelings, complaints, and emotions about their mothers. A first grade student named Rakhi Saha complained that her mother did not allow her to eat ice cream and told her to eat quickly. A second grade student named Abir Hossain said that his mother works all the time and does not play with him. In this way, children expressed their complaints and grievances to their mothers. A total of 65 children and guardians participated in the vibrant International Mother's Day event.

Independence Day

The Independence Day of 2023 was celebrated in Khalia Union on 26 March. On this occasion, those who sacrificed their lives in the country's independence war were remembered with respect in the discussion meeting. A total of 87 local youth member joined.

National Children's Day

On the occasion of the birth anniversary of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and National Children's Day, 2023, a cultural programme for local children was organized at the Somriddhi Programme Office of Gono Unnayan Prochesta, Khalia, Rajoir on 17 March. The programme included recitation of poems, songs, solo dance, group dance, and drawing competition. Students, parents, and local dignitaries learned about the childhood of the Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, his role in the country's independence movement, and his sacrifice for the nation. 82 children participated in the birthday celebration programme of the Father of the Nation.

National Youth Day

On the 1st of November 2022, a rally and discussion meeting were organized with the local youth members to celebrate National Youth Day 2022. The theme of Youth Day was: "Trained Youth, Prosperous Nation, Bangabandhu's Bangladesh". A total of 110 youth members (84 Female and 26 Male) participated in the celebration of National Youth Day.

National Mourning Day was observed on 15 August in Rajoir, Madaripur



International Mother Language Day

A discussion meeting was organized to mark the International Mother Language Day 2023 in Khalia Union. In the discussion meeting 115 local youth members (61 Female and 54 Male) participated actively.



National Social Service Day

National Social Service Day 2023 was observed on January 2 at Khalia Union. On this occasion, a rally and discussion meeting were organized with the local youth members. After the rally, 80 local youth members actively participated in the discussion meeting, including 48 Female and 32 Male.

Senior Citizen's Day

Under the "Programme for Improving the Livelihood of the Senior Citizen Community", a colorful rally and discussion meeting were organized on October 6, 2022 to celebrate the "International Senior Citizen's Day,2022" with the financial and technical assistance of PKSF in Khalia Union of Rajoir Upazila. The rally was held from the Tekerhat Kodombari Somriddhi Office premises to Shanti Kendra. In the celebration ceremony 62 senior citizen members (7 Female and 55 Male) participated.



4.4 Capacity Building through GUP Training Centre (GTC)

Gono Unnayan Prochesta started its training programme in 1976 with the objective of developing knowledge and skills of the staffs as well as the beneficiaries. The organization's training center is located in Rajoir Upazila of Madaripur District. The Training Center, adjacent to the Dhaka-Barisal Highway, is located about 85 km from Dhaka after crossing the Padma Bridge. In a peaceful and serene environment, it is located in a modern rural setting with a beautiful flower garden and a variety of fruit and forest trees. The place is charming and suitable for all kinds of training, seminars, workshops, and conferences to help improve the skills and development activities of employees and members.

The training center has two classrooms, one of which is air conditioned. Up to 75 people can be trained in the two rooms at the same time. There is also the opportunity to use various modern training materials, including multimedia. The training center has a dormitory with accommodation for 30 people.

4.5 Uplifting the Quality of the Lives of the Elderly People (UQLEP)

In August 2018, with the financial and technical assistance of PKSF, the "Senior Citizens' Livelihood Improvement Programme" was launched in Khalia Union, with the participation of all senior citizens over the age of 60. Some of the notable activities under the Senior Citizens Programme include:

- Establishment of social centers for the elderly;
- Pension schemes, special savings, and subsistence allowances for the elderly;
- Awarding the "Best Senior Citizen" and "Best Son/Daughter" awards to senior citizens and their caring children, respectively;
- Provision of special loans and training for ultra-poor senior citizens;
- Provision of elderly health care and physiotherapy aids;
- Provision of special assistance to senior citizens;
- Provision of financial assistance for the funeral of poor senior citizens; and
- Promotion of mutual cooperation between various organizations and local government institutions for the development of the elderly population.

In the reporting period, Gono Unnayan Prochesta established a "Senior Citizens' Social Center" for the senior citizens of Khalia Union at a cost of Tk.5,88,020 (Taka Five lac Eighty Eight Thousand and Twenty) on its own land near the Khalia Somriddhi Center. This social center has generated a great deal of enthusiasm among the local Senior Citizens. In addition to television, carrom board, and Ludo, the center also houses daily newspapers and religious books for the local Senior Citizens.



On a regular basis, Senior Citizens come to this center to spend their leisure time in joy and celebration. The social center has been used as a sitting place since its establishment. By attending committee meetings on a regular basis, Senior Citizens are able to discuss their problems and find solutions.

A team has been formed with the participation of all Senior Citizens in the Union, which has instilled a new life in them. Senior Citizens with financial difficulties are able to purchase whatever they like with the subsistence allowance they receive. In addition, the elderly population receives medical assistance here to address physical illnesses and problems related to aging. The total number of senior beneficiaries is currently 1,221.

Anita Mandal found a new life

"It's as if Anita Mandal has found a new lease on life – not a new lease, but a new life."

Anita Mandal, 63 years old, wife of the late Mahadev Mandal, from Bathanbari village of Khalia Unon in Rajoir Upazila of Madaripur District. Anita's husband was a day laborer, and they had three sons and two daughters. Both the sons and daughters got married over time. In the middle of the year 2020, Anita's husband passed away due to health complications.

After her husband's death, for the past few years, Anita Mandal had been working as a caretaker (Sebayet) at the nearby Bathanbari Seba Ashram. One day, on her way to the ashram, she met with an



accident due to the collision with a rough driven motorbike, resulting in a fractured hip and two broken legs. Anita's impoverished children tried to get her medical treatment in various places, but she was unable to walk properly as before. She was eventually referred to the Orthopedic Hospital, where they advised her

to use a wheelchair for mobility. But due to financial difficulties within the family, it was not possible for Anita to purchase a wheelchair. She endured immense hardship, being bedridden and unable to move freely. However, her body began to deteriorate further, and her health worsened.

Later, as part of the efforts of Somriddhi Programme by Gono Unnayan Procheta towards improving the quality of life of the elderly people, she was provided with a wheelchair. Now, she can move around her home, visit shops, temples, and the Seba Ashram at any time with the help of her wheelchair. She expresses her gratitude and appreciation to Gono Unnayan Prochesta and all those involved in this programme for providing her with this wheelchair, which has significantly improved her quality of life.

"Prabin Sonali Uddog (Tea Stall)" Programme

In the 2021-2022 fiscal year, Gono Unnayan Prochesta established the "Prabin Sonali Uddog (Tea Stall)" programme with financial and technical assistance from PKSF. This programme has helped a poor elderly person from the Khalia Union to increase his income, reduce his dependency on others and become self reliant.

Selection Process

A list of Six (06) elderly members was initially short listed from the Khalia Union, and after a thorough vetting process, Siddique Sheikh, father of the late Dalil Uddin Sheikh, from Khalia village, was selected for the "Prabin Sonali Uddog (Tea Stall)" programme.

The "Prabin Sonali Uddog (Tea Stall)" programme is running through the management of Siddique Sheikh's tea stall, and through this programme, the elderly member Siddique Sheikh is now able to earn more than before. He has already saved up enough money to build a tin roofed house. He is now financially much better off than he was in the past. Under this programme, he was provided with Tk.15,000 worth of materials to help him increase his income by running a tea shop.



5. Education Programme

5.1 Dishwari Children School

There are two Primary Schools named "Dishwari Children School" run by Gono Unnayan Prochesta, where a total of four classes from nursery to third grade are taught according to the government curriculum. One of the two children's schools is located in the Sadar of Rajoir Upazila of Madaripur District and the other in located Peace Center at Khalia Union. The two schools are run by maintaining constant communication with the Rajoir Upazila Primary Education Office; such as; for receiving government books, receiving exam papers, determining exam dates, providing annual book demands, providing students' information to the Assistant Upazila Primary Education Officer as needed, etc. In addition, the Assistant Upazila Primary Education Officers are requested to visit the said two children's schools and receive various advice on teaching and education from them. After the students are promoted in the third grade (Class III) evaluation, the teachers arrange for the promoted students to be admitted to the fourth grade (Class IV) in the nearest Primary Schools.

5.2 Somriddhi Education Programme

Under the Somriddhi Programme there are 30 Afternoon Education Support Centers (Boikalik Shikkha Sohayota Kendra) in Khalia Union. Afternoon education support centers are operated under the Somriddhi Programme of Gono Unnayan Prochesta for 2 hours a day, 6 days a week. The centers are run according to the government curriculum and PKSF guidelines to help students studying in local government or private primary schools.



To run each center smoothly, one female teacher is recruited in each center from the locality and they are trained with the help of PKSF. Monthly coordination meetings are held with parents and decisions are taken after detailed discussions about the benefits and disadvantages of the students, attendance, educational progress, development of child creativity, and performance in sports and cultural activities.

The objective of the Afternoon Education Support Centers under the Somriddhi Education Programme is to teach children attending Primary School the daily household chores, to remove the fear of school from children, provide supplementary education alongside regular schooling, help children develop their creativity through drawing, sports, singing, dancing, recitation, and cultural events, provide opportunities to bring out the hidden talents of children in physical and mental development. Through this education support center, children are involved in sports and cultural competitions to celebrate various national and international days. As a result, the dropout rate in primary education in Khalia Union has come down to zero.

5.3 Somriddhi Stipend Programme

Under the Somriddhi Programme, 20 meritorious and poor students who passed the SSC examination with GPA-4 or more in 2023 and enrolled in the first year of college have been provided with the 1st phase of scholarships, and 7 students who passed the first year final examination of college and are studying in the second year have been provided with the 2nd phase of scholarships.

In the 1st phase, 15 girls and 5 boys received scholarships, and in the 2nd phase, 13 girls and 4 boys received scholarships.

A total of 37 students were given a scholarship cheque of Tk. 12,000 per student at the rate of once a year.

In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, a total of Tk. 4,44,000 was transferred to 37 students through the hands of the UNO of Rajoir Upazila.



5.4 Bangabandhu Higher Education Scholarship

In order to commemorate the 100th birth anniversary of the Father of the Nation, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, Gono Unnayan Prochesta decided to provide a monthly scholarship of Tk.3,000 to meritorious and poor students studying in higher education in the working area.

The management authority of the organization decided to provide a scholarship named "Bangabandhu Higher Education Scholarship" for the 2022-2023 fiscal year to those students who will continue their education from undergraduate to postgraduate level without any break in education. In this year, a total of Tk.1,80,000 (Taka One lac Eighty Thousand) in cheques were distributed to six students at the rate of Tk. 3,000 (Taka Three Thousand) per month for four quarters. Among them, one is female and five are male. All six are residents of Khalia Union and Rajoir Municipality of Rajoir Upazila.

As a result of the Bangabandhu Higher Education Scholarship Programme provided by the organization, the desire to achieve higher education has increased among the poor and meritorious students of the area, and the worries of the poor family of the student about the educational expenses of the child have decreased. Besides the students have become more focused on their studies.



6. Health Programme

6.1 Health and Nutrition Programme

Health and nutrition activities are one of the most important activities of the Somriddhi Programme. Among the 200 Somriddhi Unions supported by the funding of PKSF, 50 Unions have been listed as Digital Health Service Unions. Among them, Khalia union of Rajoir Upazila is included as a Digital Health Service Union.

Under this Service the health related information of all members of the 5715 households of Khalia Union is stored/preserved on PKSF's designated server. If any member of the said Union wants to collect health related information at any time, she/he can see it with the help of the designated ID number of the said household. Information like, checking how the blood pressure of a hypertensive patient has been fluctuating for the past one month or how was the blood sugar level of a diabetic patient for the past one year, can be collected. As a result, it is convenient for doctors to diagnose diseases and the people of Khalia, like the people of developed countries, can know and monitor their health status information.

Through the Health and Nutrition Service Activities of Somriddhi Programme, all member families of the Union get nutrition and health services at the doorsteps free of cost. Two Health Officers and 12 Health Inspectors are involved in the implementation of the programme. Each Health Inspector visits 20 families or households daily. Family based health cards are sold (at a nominal fee) and services are provided at static and satellite clinics by identifying diseases. Health Inspectors regularly diagnose blood pressure and diabetes in pregnant women and common people as per instructions, measure MUAC tape (nutrition check), weight and height of children and collect family health information. According to the need, they are referred to the static clinic or satellite clinic of the Somriddhi Programme and advised to go to the government health and family planning doctor.







Treatment status in Static and Satellite Clinics

Health Officers provide medical care at static clinics and organize Health Camps at Satellite Clinics under the Somriddhi Programme. They monitor and supervise the activities of Health Inspectors and perform various administrative tasks under Health Programmes. They determine blood groups according to instructions, organize nutrition camps, various health and medical camps at regular intervals, such as eye, gynecology, child health, skin and sexual, ear-nose-throat, rheumatism, and dental camps. Two satellite clinics are organized every week, and at the satellite clinics, local patients are provided with free medical prescriptions, iron tablets, and calcium tablets by the organization's part time MBBS doctors. Free medical prescriptions and medicines are provided by specialist doctors at health and medical camps.

In addition, deworming tablets, iron tablets, calcium tablets, and nutritious particles are provided free of charge throughout the year. In the case of complex patients, they are advised to go to a government or a suitable hospital. To make family members feel that they are getting health care for a fee of Tk.100 per year, not for free, each family is encouraged to purchase a health card for a fee of Tk.100 per year.

As in the neighboring Union, there should be three or more Community Clinics at the government level in the Khalia Union in the health sector, but since there is no Community Clinic in this Union and on the basis of the demand of the local people, all kinds of health care and nutritional supports are provided here under the Somriddhi Programme.




Figure 7: Patients attended at the Static & Satellite Clinic

6.2 Health Camps

Rheumatic Pain Treatment Camp

On December 26, 2022, a "Rheumatic Pain Treatment Camp 2022" was organized in Khalia Union of Rajoir Upazila of Madaripur District as part of the Health Programme with the financial and technical assistance of PKSF under the initiative of the Somriddhi Programme. As in previous years, two specialist doctors provided prescriptions and distributed medicines to the patients who came to the camp. No money or fees are charged for prescriptions and medicines provided by specialist doctors from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm. This Health Programme of the organization has been running for a long time with the trust and love of the patients. It is worth mentioning that the patients of this region wait to see the doctor at the Rheumatic Pain Treatment Camp of Gono Unnayan Prochesta. In the fiscal year 2022-2023, a total of 240 patients, 202 Female and 38 Male, from Khalia Union came to the Rheumatic Pain Treatment Camp and received services. During the opening ceremony of this year's camp, the chief guest (Chairman of Khalia Union Parishad) said in his speech, "The role of Gono Unnayan Prochesta in the post-independence period is undeniable. As a result of various social and health services conducted in this area at different times, the people of this area are now much more health-conscious." In his speech, he also gave a detailed account of the organization's relief activities in the past years.

Mother and Child Health Care Camp

Gono Unnayan Prochesta has been providing health care for children and mothers in Khalia Union and the southern-western region of Bangladesh for over 50 years. On May 30, 2023, a "Mother and Child Health Care Camp" was organized in Khalia Union of Rajoir Upazila with the financial and technical assistance of PKSF under the Somriddhi Programme. Two specialist doctors provided free mother and child health care prescriptions and medicines to patients through the camp. A total of 178 patients (101 Female and 77 Male) received services in the camp. Patients in this area are very confident for the health care of Gono Unnayan Prochesta.



Skin and Allergy Health Camp

A "Skin and Allergy Health Camp" was organized in Khalia Union under the Somriddhi Programme with support from PKSF. The camp was conducted by two expert doctors. In the camp, a total of 210 patients, including 158 Female and 52 Male were provided with free prescriptions and medicines.



Ear, Nose and Throat Health Camp

A free "Ear, Nose and Throat Health Camp" was organized on October 27, 2022, in Khalia Union with support from PKSF under the Somriddhi Programme. Many people in this area suffer from complicated ear, nose, and throat problems. The cost of treatment for these diseases is very expensive, so many people do not pay much attention to the problems. At the camp, two specialist doctors provided free medical care for ear, nose, and throat problems. Free prescriptions and medicines were distributed. In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, 133 Female and 42 Male, a total of 175 patients, received free prescriptions and medicines at the Camp.

6.3 GUP Physiotherapy and Rehabilitation Centre (GPRC)

Gono Unnayan Prochesta has established Physiotherapy and Rehabilitation Centre (GPRC) in February 2015 at its jono Shashtho Seba Campus in Khalia village to ensure Physiotherapy and Rehabilitation service available for poor local people and also to support poor paralysis patients with minimum costly service. Physiotherapy is a health care profession that assesses, diagnoses, treats and works to prevent disease and disability through physical means. Initially, necessary equipment was procured for rendering high quality of services to the patients by the financial support from the German Embassy.

GPRC has a team of eight personnel which includes one center incharge and chief physiotherapist, one clinical physiotherapist with a health care professional physiotherapy degree as well as ability to work fast and accurately, two Assistant Physiotherapists with diploma degree, two trained Work Assistants, one center Supervisor and one-night guard. The Physiopherapists with his all staff of GPRC have active participation to screen new patients through primary assessment and provide physiotherapy treatment successfully with their better management. They also collaborate with other hospitals, clinics and physiotherapy centers through two way communication.

Physiotherapists at GPRC use their knowledge and skills to improve a range of conditions associated with different systems of the body such as:

- Neurological conditions (stroke, GBS, multiplesclerosis, parkinsons diseases);
- Neuromuscular skeletal conditions (back pain, arthritis);
- Cardiovascular conditions (chronic heart disease, rehabilitation after heart attack);
- Respiratory conditions (asthma, pulmonary disease);
- Pediatrics conditions (cerebral palsy, autism, cludfoot).

In addition, GPRC team members are trying to increase awareness among general people about disability and the need of physiotherapy. They publicize and broadcast at local bazaar and public places through a loudspeaker for informing about the physiotherapy treatment. An effective linkage has been established with the respective medical center hospitals or clinics, while the most severe cases patients are referred to those hospitals or clinics for further treatment.



Residential facilities of GPRC

There are thirteen normal Cabins, three VIP Cabins and an open environmental yard for the patients who come from long distance or those who have severe mobility problems. A good number of the population of Rajoir Upazila are working abroad as hard manual workers. Often they are suffering from back pain, stiffness of spinal cord injury, neuromascular pain, stroke, etc. During vacations, they come at their native land and some of them come at GPRC for their treatmeant. GPRC works with a motif "to take the patient from the bed to the work". The patients benefited through physiotherapy treatments with GPRC are: Recovery from truma and stroke, Reduce pain & disability, Improve mobility, Improve the quality of ADL (Activities of daily living) and Management of age-related medical problems (Geriatric conditions).

Since its inception in February 2015 the cumulative members of patients numbering 28877 were treated in GPRC. Inclusion of female physiotherapist in the team has been proved benefitting for female patients to get quality treatment. Total income of GPRC during the reporting period was Tk.29,26,636 and total expenditure was Tk. 13,54,666. So, the surplus was Tk.15,71,970.

Sohel Sheikh is recovering well

"The center's management and the dedicated doctors have been instrumental in helping Sohel Sheikh make a full recovery. Sohel Sheikh and his family are grateful to everyone involved in his treatment and recovery."

Mr. Sohel Sheikh, a 32-year old resident of Jatrabari, Muksedpur Upazila, Gopalganj District, has been going through a tough life with four daughters. He used to work as a carpenter in Jashore District, struggling to make ends meet. On May 15, 2023 he went to brush his teeth and felt that he couldn't raise his hand. He had to exert a lot of effort to brush his teeth. Afterward, when he tried to wash his head during a shower, he couldn't do it. The next day, he couldn't even get up from bed. With the support of his family, he went to the local hospital for treatment. The doctors there advised him to seek treatment at Dhaka's Neuro Science Hospital. On May 17th, with the help of his father and relatives, he was admitted to the Neuro Science Hospital in Dhaka.

After a thorough examination, the doctors at the hospital determined that he was suffering from Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS). He would need physiotherapy for several days. The physiotherapists



conducted various tests and provided treatment services. Due to financial difficulties, the treatment had to be halted for a while. Sohel's father sold their land to cover the medical expenses. During this time, Sohel Sheikh could not walk, and his body was in severe pain. He had to be supported to move around.

On the 28th of May, he was discharged from the Neuro Science Hospital and started taking medication alongside physiotherapy at the Gono Unnayan Prochesta Physiotherapy and Rehabilitation Center the next day. After about three to four weeks of treatment at the rehabilitation center, his pain started to subside, and he began to walk with assistance.

According to Dr. Maruful Islam, the doctor at the Gono Unnayan Prochesta Physiotherapy and Rehabilitation Center, after one or two more weeks of treatment, Sohel Sheikh will be able to resume his regular work. The center's management and the dedicated doctors have been instrumental in helping Sohel Sheikh make a full recovery. Sohel Sheikh and his family are grateful to everyone involved in his treatment and recovery.

6.4 Annual Eye Camp

Gono Unnayan Prochesta, as it does every year, organized a free "Eye Care and Cataract Surgery Camp" in the 2022-2023 reporting year. The camp received assistance from the 'Dhaka Progressive Lions Eye Hospital' Tekerhat in all aspects of patient care, including examination and surgery.

At the Somriddhi Office premises in Khalia, doctors and staff separated patients who were eligible for cataract surgery and provided prescriptions and medicines to patients with other eye problems under this programme. Selected patients were taken to the Tekerhat Hospital for Cataract Surgery. After the surgery, they were brought back to the Somriddhi Office premises the next day. The Cataract Surgery patients were sent home after being instructed on the rules of medication and use.

In the 2022-2023 fiscal year, there were a total of 286 patients (217 Female and 69 Male) at the Eye Camp, and a total of 80 patients (53 Female and 27 Male) underwent Cataract Surgery. All 80 patients who underwent cataract surgery are doing well and can now see clearly.







7. Support Programme

7.1 Collaborative research on Evaluation of Maternity Policies to achieve SDG-3: Demedicalization and Positive Birth Experiences' with Nara Women's University (NWU), Japan

This Project was implemented with Nara Women University (NWU), Japan. There were two phases of the Project. In the 1st phase, data collection was the major activity from Rajoir & Khalia Union of Rajoir Upazilla under Madaripur District. The data collection of the Project was completed in April 2021. The 2nd phase of the Project has started from April 2022. The major activities of the phase are validation, analysis and publication of report. In the 2nd phase (Reporting period) the team leader of the research Project is kept continuous communication with Gono Unnayan Prochesta and Project Officer of the project engaged them for validation and analysis of data. As per our understanding Nara Women University of Japan will publish a book where one chapter will be there separately on Gono Unnayan Prochesta and its involvement with the Maternity Policies to achieve SDG-3 demedicalization and Positive Birth Experiences' related activities. Hopefully this report will be published by March 2024.

7.2 Field Level Water Quality Testing Project

Gono Unnayan Prochesta has been implementing Field Level Water Quality Testing Project since March 2010 with HYSAWA through the financial assistance of GOB-DANIDA- HYSAWA, HYSAWA- AUSAID and HYSAWA- SDC. The objective of the project is to monitor the water quality of the newly installed Deep Hand Tube Wells (DHTW) through Field Testing Kit Boxes. Mainly Arsenic (AS), Iron (Fe), 20% Manganese (Mn) and Chloride (Cl) parameters are tested from the newly installed water points. Moreover, Global positioning System (GPS) reading has been collected from all the water points. Out of the total tested 10% water samples has been re-tested from the recognized Laboratories like DPHE Zonal Laboratory for comparison with the field testing results. A total of 110 Deep Hand Tube Wells has been tested from Cox's bazar region during the reporting period covering 5 Unions from Ukhiya and 2 Unions from Teknaf Upazila. Since the beginning, GUP has tested a total of 33,953 water points from 91 Upazilas of 28 Districts benefiting near about 3,39,530 households (cumulative) of Barisal, Pirozpur, Jhalokathi, Patualikhali, Madaripur, Shariatpur, Gopalganj, Faridpur, Rajbari, Noakhali, Feni, Laxmipur, Khulna, Satkhira, Bagerhat, Jashore, Norail, Pabna, Natore, Rajshahi, Naogaon, Gaibandha, Thakurgaon, Rangpur, Rangamati, Bandarban, Khagrachori and Cox's Bazar Districts who are now drinking safe water. It may be mentioned here that usually one Deep Hand Tube Well covers 10 Families of the respective community.

Due to the pandemic situation of COVID 19, the Installation work of Water Points was near to be stopped. There was a scarcity of Fund flow. HYSAWA is now trying to collect fund for smooth running of the Project.

Expected Outcomes of this project

- Safe Water access in Hard to Reach (HtoR) areas in Bangladesh;
- Awareness raising on safe drinking water as it is recognized as one of the fundamental issues of human rights;
- Improved Hygiene;
- Sustainable Sanitation

It can be mentioned that during the 2022-2023 fiscal year, no new tube-wells were distributed. Thirty shallow tube-wells and three deep tube-wells were replaced through arsenic testing as per allocation. It is noted that the tube-wells installed by the organization were found to have arsenic levels within the permissible limit after testing, which is suitable for drinking and all other purposes. The maintenance of tube wells is regularly monitored to ensure that they are being maintained properly.

7.3 Infrastructure Development works/Projects

- Renovation/Construction work of a 2 storied Guest House at Rajoir Staff House Compound with 6 room facilities is going on smoothly. Main Structure, 2 roof and brick work have been completed during the reporting period. Electrical, Sanitary and Plastering work is going on. Hopefully the Construction work will be completed by October 2023. 12 Guests can be accommodated there with standard facilities.
- A semi permanent building covering 3 rooms with a long veranda has been constructed at Rajoir office compound for using as Store room.
- 14 Rooms have been renovated at the Physio Therapy Center where there are 13 rooms for 26 Patients and 01 room for Doctors use. It is being used nicely.
- Bamboo fencing/ Palisading work done for protection of the embankment of the pond in front of GPRC. This pond is used mainly by the Patient of GPRC and their attendant.
- 175 pieces of RCC pillar has been made for the fencing work of the boundary of Khalia Health Center.
- A Recreation Centre / Meeting Room has been constructed for the Old People under ENRICH Project at Khalia Health Center. This recreation center is mainly used for the recreation of the old aged people by watching TV, playing Carom Board and their meeting purposes.
- A staff house is under construction by using the Batik production center at Rajoir. It will be completed by October 2023. 2 Family Quarters, 3 Rooms for 3 single female staff and 4 rooms for 4 single Male Staff can be accommoded there.



8. Impact, Lessons learned and Challenges

8.1 Impact of Gono Unnayan Prochesta's activities

The COVID-19 pandemic Situation is almost over. The reporting year was the recovery year of the community people. Gono Unnayan Prochesta started it's all normal activities in the field. All beneficiaries started their normal small and medium level business. In this reporting year Gono Unnayan Prochesta with the financial assistance of PKSF introduced some new Projects related to corona recovery phase which helped our beneficiaries to go back to their normal life. Our beneficiaries proved that they can overcome very disastrous situation without relief and donation from the outside and they also proved that if they got financial support then they (Beneficiaries) can overcome all sorts of barrier. Along with the Microfinance Programme Gono Unnayan Prochesta implemented other programme activities in the field like: organizing different Health Camps, Eye Camps, Meetings, Workshop and Seminars in its field level which helped them to go back to their normal life.

8.2 Lessons learned

There are some learning experiences from the activities implemented under different Projects and the core Programme of Gono Unnayan Prochesta:

- Awareness Building Campaign was effective regarding how to go back to normal life after disastrous effect of COVID-19;
- COVID-19 situation created the opportunity to develop confidence of the affected people towards sustainability;
- How alternative business/Income Generating Activities can help corona affected people to come back to their normal life;
- Alternative way of Monitoring Field Activities is developed.

8.3 Challenges

The reporting period was recovery period from the corona pandemic situation. During the reporting period, we faced the following challenges:

- Borrowers are still behind to clear the dues which were overdue during the corona period;
- Adjustment of low interest rate of loan money with normal interest (12.5%) loan money in the field;
- Some of the Beneficiaries intentionally showed their inability to repay their overdue;
- Inter district migration has created some problems for recovery of overdues;
- Uncontrolled Competition between different microfinance organizations.

9. Way Forward

Gono Unnayan Prochesta is committed to promote equity, justice, peace and prosperity in the society through a variety of activities and programmes that are both sustainable and environmentally friendly. With the designation of Bangladesh as a Middle Income Country, donor funds are gradually shrinking day by day. The COVID-19 situation is also included to keep donor funds in check. However, Corona situation is almost over now. Under these new circumstances, and in order to make the Gono Unnayan Prochesta self sustaining and increase its capacity to serve the poor, the organization will continue its efforts in expanding Credit Operations within existing and other potential fields. For this expansion Gono Unnayan Prochesta will consider the loan diversity, quality of operation and new areas of financing. In case of area expansion, organization firstly will go further within its current geographic locations and in some case area will be expanded for strategic reason.

Considering the evolving trend of digitalization, Gono Unnayan Prochesta will keep continuing its effort for full digitalization of its Microfinance operation as a whole. The modern equipment with updated software and enhancing soft skills among the personnel engaged with the same programme are now the demands of the time. Gono Unnayan Prochesta will continue specific efforts in enhancing its staff's capacity both in terms of technical and soft skills management by organizing training, orientation, exchange visits and training trajectory. Gono Unnayan Prochesta will introduce electronic financial transaction system in its Microfinance Programme from this financial year.

Gono Unnayan Prochesta is now more financially stable in compare to previous years. The organization is intending to increase human rights, peace promotion, gender development, water sanitation, climate change and capacity development (both community people and staff) related Programme in addition to the Microfinance Programme.

It has established a Physiotherapy Centre in Khalia Health Centre with surplus sales proceeds from different Programmes to properly utilise its infrastructure. Now the physiotherapy centre became one of the well reputed centres in South West Region of Bangladesh. Gono Unnayan Prochesta will give more emphasis to install the modern equipments for enhancing the treatment facilities of the patients. In addition to the equipment Gono Unnayan Prochesta will also put extreme effort for the infrastructural development of Physiotherapy Centre to create it as ideal one in the Southwest region of Bangladesh.

Considering the physical communication advancement (i.e. Padma Bridge) and knowing its potentials Gono Unnayan Prochesta will continue to improve its infrastructural development (i.e. facilities for training and other commercial events) within its Peace Centre to attract visitors.

To mitigate the challenges Gono Unnayan Prochesta will increase communication, coordination and maintaining liaison with local NGOs and other coordinating body through different coordination meeting, workshop and seminar.

The organization will continue its effort to establish its own office building in Dhaka for its central office considering the importance of such infrastructure in case of branding and organizational sustainability.

10. Governance and Management

General Council (GC)

General Council (GC) is made up of 27 highly qualified members with a variety of professional backgrounds. The General Council formulates policies, elects the Executive Committee (EC), adopts the annual report, passes audited financial statements, approves budgets, and selects the organization's auditor.



Executive Committee (EC)

The Executive Committee is made up of 9 (nine) distinguished professionals from various fields. All General Council (GC) and Executive Committee (EC) meetings are chaired by the President of the EC. The EC has the authority to provide the organisation with broad policy guidelines. The Executive Director is appointed by the EC. He reports to EC and is in charge of the day-to-day operations and management of Gono Unnayan Prochesta . He also serves as the Secretary General of Executive Committee. The EC works for a period of three years.

Senior Management Committee (SMC)

The Executive Director, Directors, Deputy Directors, and Assistant Directors make up the Senior Management Committee (SMC). SMC works aiming decentralization of administration. The Executive Director (ED) leads the SMC and manages and implements Gono Unnayan Prochesta's programmes and projects with the help of Senior Management Committee. There are 9 members in the SMC.




13. Timeline of Gono Unnayan Prochesta
